**Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes
Report to Tennessee Baptist Associations
2018**

Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes continues to provide a Christian residential ministry for senior adults and for exceptional adults. This ministry is provided in senior adult living communities and in residential group homes in several locations within our great state. The most notable change to the ministry of TBAH during this past year is that we sold the Baptist Health Care Center in Lenoir City. The sweeping changes in the delivery of nursing home care over the past two decades gave rise to the need to sell the facility. Its antiquated architecture and the monumental expenditures that would be required to make it compatibility with newer codes and requirements to make it a Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF).

The proceeds from the sale of the Baptist Health Care Center have been used to retire the debt that had been incurred in the beginning phases of Williams Ferry Pointe, an independent living retirement community adjacent to the health care center. We have been working closely with a developer and with the city to get building started again at Williams Ferry Pointe.

Baptist Village of Johnson City now has a new manager. After serving faithfully for over 20 years as Manager there, Sarah Farmer of Johnson City, retired and Carol Church has been named the new Manager for the location. These duplex homes are for retirees who need affordable housing and the rent is based on income. Preference is given to retired ministers and missionaries.

The Deer Lake Retirement Community in the Bellevue community of Nashville is a 135-condominium unit complex for retirees. These modest duplex homes offer home ownership in an affordable retirement community. TBAH provides a manager for the complex and employs a part-time chaplain for the spiritual care of these independent seniors.

The group home ministry for exceptional adults continues to provide a Christian home for up to 55 men and women who need assistance and supervision. These homes, located in Nashville, Lebanon, Knoxville, and Jacksboro are often a forever home for the individuals who move in. Their diminished intellectual abilities would make them too vulnerable to live alone in the community. These homes provide family. Your generous gifts to the annual Father's Day Offering keeps these homes going.

Finally, the Special Friends Camps were near capacity in attendance this summer. Funded primarily by the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions, these camps provide at least three things; 1) a week of activities for the campers with intellectual and physical disabilities, 2) a week of respite for the families of the campers who provide care day in and day out at home, and 3) two weeks of rewarding, hard work for the young people who staff the camps...not to mention the life-long friendships these young staffers make as Counselors.

The Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes, Inc.

The Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes has been ministering to children who have found themselves in hard places for 127 years! Speaking of 127, James 1:27 says, *"Pure and undefiled religion in the sight of our God and Father is this: to visit orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world."* It is the mission of TBCH to be obedient to this command of Scripture concerning children who need someone besides their parents to care for them.

As of this writing, TBCH has ministered to 117 different children in **Residential Care** this year. While many of these children still reside on one of our three campuses, 33 children have been successfully reunited with their families, and 2 children have been adopted and placed in a forever family! We have assisted 13 of our young adults as they transition out of our care into adulthood.

To cut our deficit spending, our residential program is now active in three locations: The Ranch @ Millington, The Brentwood Campus, and the Chattanooga Campus. Today, we have beds for 88 children in residential care with the goal over the next year to increase that number to 96. Streamlining to three campuses, while challenging, was a necessary component in our strategic plan to double the number of children we serve at any one time by 2020.

TBCH's **Foster Care** Program has served 108 children and has had 32 sets of Christian parents commit to be Foster Families. Several of these children are in "Foster to Adopt" situations that we are praying will result in more children having permanent homes. Already this year we have had 7 children adopted and placed in a forever family! We are also pleased to announce that our no-cost contract with the State of TN's Department of Children's Services has been renewed for another five years. We are excited about the expansion of our George Shinn Foster Care Program and the continued ability to place children who are in state custody with Christian parents.

TBCH is also excited about the launch of our new ministry called **Family Care** as of June 1, 2018. Kelly Campbell is taking the lead in networking with our churches and other organizations in an effort to support and enable churches, biological families, foster families and adoptive parents to be successful in the task that God has called them to concerning children.

Join us in praising the Lord for the 9 children in our care who have been born again while on our campuses or in one of our foster homes! Through the faithful service of our staff, our foster families, the local church, and by God's grace an eternal impact is being made on the lives of the children who come into the care of TBCH.

Total Impact: The Lord has allowed TBCH the honor of ministering the love of Jesus Christ to a total of 2,418 souls from November 1, 2017 through July 26, 2018. This number reflects the specific individuals that have been affected by the ministry of TBCH including residents and their families, other families we have ministered to through counseling as well as our foster children and their families.

This great work would not be possible without the faithful support of Tennessee Baptists. Thank you for supporting the Cooperative Program and the Mother's Day Offering that directly blesses the children in our care.

Tennessee Woman's Missionary Union 2018 Annual Report

The WMU emphasis for 2017-18 was "By All Means" based on 1 Cor. 9:22b-23 focused us on challenging Christ followers to follow His example as we step into the world around us, cultivating relationships and creating opportunities to demonstrate the love of Christ.

Highlights from the past year include:

- The 2017-18 State Acteens Advisory Panelists were Maegan Adkins, Truett Association; Grace Clouse, Caney Fork Baptist Church, Cookeville; Amanda Huggins, Unaka Avenue Baptist Church, Johnson City; SandiGlen Jones, First Baptist Church Sevierville; and Mia Selvidge, Cedar Fork Baptist Church, Sweetwater.
- The theme for the 2017-18 Tennessee Missions Emphasis was "At All Costs Obey." The suggested dates for the Week of Prayer for State Missions was September 10-17 and the goal for the 2017-18 Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions was \$1,925,000. As of July 26, 2018, the total amount given to the 2017-18 Golden Offering is \$1,733,260.46. The offering year goes from September 1 – August 31.
- October is always a busy time for children's missions events.
 - Over the three weekends of JAM, there were 443 participants, from 50 churches.
 - At RA Camp-O-Ree, there were 445 campers and adult leaders
- In December, Tennessee WMU mailed, on behalf of Tennessee Baptists:
 - Checks for \$150 to 22 missionary kids whose parents serve with IMB
 - Checks for \$50 to 81 retired IMB missionaries, who are from Tennessee.
 - These gifts are made possible through an allocation from the Golden Offering
- Missions Get-Together & Connection were held on March 16-18, 2018 at the Gatlinburg Convention Center with a total attendance of 1,495. The annual offering totaled \$9,475.33 with 90% designated to Tennessee WMU missions efforts in Denver/Front Range; 10% benefited Tennessee WMU Touch Tomorrow Today Endowment at the WMU Foundation. Through the event ministry project, participants brought 521 backpacks filled with school supplies to benefit City Reach: Nashville
- Martha Pitts from Germantown Baptist Church was elected to her third term as President, during the Tennessee WMU Annual Meeting on March 17, 2018 at the Gatlinburg Convention Center. Other officers elected for 2018-19 include Recording Secretary, Charlyene Couey, Nashville; and three Vice Presidents, i.e. West: Jeanette West, Memphis; Middle, Colleen Richardson, Livingston; and East, Janice Lewelling, Dunlap.
- In March 2018, \$38,400 in scholarships were awarded to 33 students attending graduate school, seminary, as well as, undergraduate schools in Tennessee during the 2018-19 school year. These scholarships are funded through endowments, invested funds and the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions.
- Tennessee WMU sent three Prayer Walking Mission Teams to Denver in 2018 with a total 16 participants.
- Currently we have 20 Christian Women's Job Corps and eight Christian Men's Job Corps sites in Tennessee. This Christian based program, seeks to help men and women in breaking the cycle of poverty through job and life skills classes, Bible study, and mentoring. In 2017, Tennessee sites served 1,639 participants with 741 completing the program. We recorded 210 spiritual decisions, which included 40 professions of faith.
- In July 2018, four new Literacy Missions volunteers participated in the National Literacy Missions Workshop in Shocco Springs, Alabama. Tennessee Literacy Missions now has five English as a Second Language (ESL) workshop trainers (two in East, two in Middle and one in West), one Adult Reading and Writing workshop trainer and one Tutoring Children and Youth workshop trainer. Together these ministries can bring Tennesseans to Christ, through Literacy Missions.

Currently, Tennessee WMU staff includes Vickie Anderson, Executive Director-Treasurer; Denise Bronaugh, Adult Missions and Ministries Specialist; Juliana Wilson, Communications & Children Missions Specialist; Beth Moore, Student & Literacy Missions Specialist; Vickie Clemons, Administrative Assistant; *vacant*, Ministry Assistant; Brian Holt, RA/Challenger State Coordinator, and Janice Carter, CWJC/CMJC State Coordinator.

Working together to encourage and equip churches, and individuals, to engage in missions learning and involvement that helps them to fulfill the Great Commission.

2017 Annual Report

Since 1938 the Tennessee Baptist Foundation has been of service to Tennessee Baptists and Kingdom causes around the world. The assets under management of the Foundation have grown from \$6,577 to \$148 million during that time. God continues to bless this ministry and we are pleased to make our report to the convention as to highlights for the fiscal year 2017-18 thus far. The Foundation is pleased to offer the following services to Tennessee Baptists:

1. Presenting informational Faith-based estate planning seminars for churches
2. Working with individuals, helping them develop distinctively Christian personal estate plans
3. Consulting with individuals on the preparation of their Wills and Powers of Attorney
4. Assisting individuals in their establishment of various Charitable Trusts
5. Serving as Trustee of trusts and funds committed to its care
6. Providing investment services to Tennessee Baptist churches and institutions
7. Serving as executor of estates, upon request, in which a Baptist cause(s) is a beneficiary
8. Offering loans to Tennessee Baptist churches/associations
9. Providing grants for qualifying new ministries and projects

Highlights of the Foundation's stewardship thus far for this fiscal year include:

- Funds under management: Over 1,100
- Assets under management: \$147,871,759 (as of June 30, 2018)
- New funds under fund management agreements: \$1,035,000 (8 new funds)
- Educational grants and scholarships: 226 - totaling \$240,500 for 2018-2019 academic year (Over \$5.4 million since 1987)
- Special Project Grants: \$69,980 distributed to assist 24 ministry projects
- Cooperative Program: \$326,282 as of June 30, 2018. Project to give over \$500,000 by year end.
- Other Baptist and charitable causes: \$2,021,972 as of June 30, 2018. Project to give over \$3 million by year end.

Another 2018 graduate, Ali Renckens, wrote in the Cardinal & Cream, Union’s student news publication, about her experience at Union:

“I have seen Christ in every class I’ve taken. And not just because of a two-minute pre-class prayer, but because of how the professors treat students as valued individuals. They have trained me to think analytically, to consider different perspectives, and to continually challenge my own assumptions and beliefs. They have taught me that it is possible to be kind, compassionate, and loving while also having the mettle to combat false teaching and godless beliefs.”

As Union University strives to be faithful to our mission in an age when traditional Christian beliefs are continually under assault, we value the ongoing prayers and support of our Tennessee Baptist partners.

Carson-Newman University Report 2018

Your support helps us fulfill the Great Commission of going into “all the world.” We have not yet made it everywhere, of course. but with time and resources, that is our hope.

This past year has included:

- At the start of the academic year, the University welcomed hundreds of families to campus for its annual Prayer Walk and Welcome Ceremony. The tradition led one parent to note: "This was an amazing way for my son to start his college adventure. This event gave us as parents the added assurance that he's right where God led him."
- Carson-Newman unveiled a new university logo proclaiming its mission in higher education by prominently featuring "A Christian University" within the new logo.
- The University's Board of Trustees and President O'Brien led the University to adopt the 2000 Baptist Faith & Message as guiding principals of operation.
- Baptist Collegiate Ministries (BCM) sent 115 students, faculty and staff members across the world through spring break mission trips. Teams took part in a variety of projects including serving others at the Iditarod in Alaska, hurricane relief efforts in Puerto Rico and at the Baptist Children's Home in Chattanooga. Puerto Rico relief efforts were in partnership with Tennessee Baptist Disaster Relief, while the Alaska site was through a partnership with a former NAMB missionary in service with Graceworks Ministries. Other partnerships included LifeWay's BeachReach Ministry and local YOKE Youth ministries. BCM programs and events saw 59 known professions of faith and over 30 known rededications.
- Some 70 students donated their time to help with efforts in assembling over 100 Easter baskets for children in need on behalf of a local Christian-based ministry, Food on Foot.
- This past year, Carson-Newman athletic teams saw over 25 known professions of faith and five rededications. The swim team held a baptism for a team member in the campus pool.
- Carson-Newman was ranked in the top 50 best Christian colleges in the nation by College Atlas.
- Colleges of Distinction recognized the University with its seal of approval, including a separate designation as “Christian College of Distinction.”
- Appalachian Outreach saw one known profession of faith and seven rededications. AO oversaw home repair projects for 14 families across four East Tennessee counties. This summer volunteers as far away as Mississippi and Indiana took part in ministry efforts.
- Samaritan House served 52 families (52 adults and 28 children). The shelter provided a total of 4651 days of care. In addition to providing shelter, Samaritan House provided 13,953 hot meals to residents and members of the community who attended its Tuesday Night Bible Study.
- Nursing students and faculty traveled to Haiti on a medical mission trip. The group made home visits, worked with cancer patients and held clinics on the frontier for area villages.

Highlights presented here are possible because of the cooperation of Tennessee Baptists. Some programs, like certain mission trips, are made possible by the underwriting of individual like-hearted supporters who want to help Carson-Newman educate students and help share the Gospel.

Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy (The King's Academy)

Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy celebrates 138 years as a distinctively Christian school. For the past 24 years, Tennessee Baptist's accredited Christian boarding and day school has operated as The King's Academy. During this recent period enrollment increased 400% and the school budget grew to \$6 million. International students are the academy's most distinctive feature—over 1,000 students from 98 nations enrolled since 1935; an average of 14 countries are represented in the academy student body each year.

Of great concern, TBC's Cooperative Program's portion of the school budget declined during this same period from 35% of the school budget to less than 6%, and is projected to continue to drop precipitously in the next two years. The academy strives to address these financial challenges with a more aggressive development program and increases in student fees. Given the socio-economic demographics of academy families, increases in fees translate into enrollment declines.

Nevertheless, the academy remains focused on its VISION – *Transformed Lives, Empowered by Christ-like Character, Pursuing Academic Excellence and Lifelong Service* – and committed to its MISSION: *The King's Academy inspires and equips students of all cultural backgrounds to fulfill their God-given potential in a nurturing, college preparatory community.*

In June 2018 Board of Trustees Chair Dr. D. Carter Davis announced Matthew Mercer of Powell, Tennessee, as the academy's new President/Headmaster. Mercer took the helm as Dr. Walter Grubb retired following 24 years in that leadership role and 7 years prior to that as principal. Mr. Mercer believes the Lord sovereignly guided his family to TKA, and is very excited about leading a school that has such a rich history. Mercer served as Headmaster at First Baptist Academy, a day school ministry of First Baptist Church of Powell, Tennessee. Previously he was an administrator at Grace Christian Academy, a day school ministry of Grace Baptist Church of Knoxville. Mercer has also coached basketball extensively in the Knoxville area.

Other highlights of the 2017-2018 school year include:

- In August, 1500 visitors enjoyed a total solar eclipse event on campus.
- Dr. Randall O'Brien, President of Carson-Newman University, delivered the 2018 Commencement Address; Rev. Dominique Lee, Pastor of Hope Fellowship, Knoxville, was the featured Baccalaureate Speaker.
- Les Greer was named Athletic Director and Head Football Coach.
- Rising Seniors Maddie Webber and Regan Weekly were named All-American softball players for the second consecutive year.
- Thanks to the generosity of the Brandes and Klepacki families of Florida and Tennessee, the new Brandes Family Dining Room opened in November 2017.
- Pastor Kenny Rains and First Baptist Church of Oliver Springs launched a unique partnership with TKA, funding new language arts curricula for elementary grades.
- Chaplain Nick Swarthout announces seven students accepted Christ. He baptized a student from Brazil in the Atlantic Ocean during a dorm retreat at Myrtle Beach, SC, and another Brazilian student at Grace Baptist Church in Seymour. This spring, a recent Taiwanese graduate visited campus to share that she was baptized at Mt. Harmony Baptist Church in Knoxville.

It is a distinct privilege for the academy family to partner with and serve alongside Tennessee Baptists in the mission of Christian education.

Baptist Memorial Health Care System
Memphis, Tennessee

Baptist Memorial Health Care began as a 150-bed hospital in downtown Memphis in 1912. It was formed by the Southern Baptist Conventions of Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas because they recognized a tremendous need for a health care facility in this part of the country. The hospital's early days were rough – at one point, it almost closed – but eventually it grew to become the largest private hospital in the world. The hospital played a very important role in the history of health care in the 20th century, celebrating many firsts along the way.

The Baptist Memorial Health Care system was created in 1981 to provide an integrated health care delivery system offering a full continuum of care to communities throughout the Mid-South. Today, a total of 21 hospitals in Arkansas, Tennessee and Mississippi; an 800-member physician group; and dozens of other entities are affiliated with Baptist.

Baptist Memorial Health Care's staff chaplains are a part of the health care team. Patients, family members or employees can ask that a chaplain be involved in spiritual or emotional care. In our hospitals, our chaplains represent their own faith but deal with spiritual issues that transcend denominational lines.

In August 2017, Baptist's Pastoral Care Department introduced the Rev. Jimmy Terry Preaching Series: It's All About Jesus, and it has been a tremendous success. Through the series, Gospel messages have reached more than 100,000 people in person or through social media.

The series is named in memory of a beloved member of Baptist's Board of Trustees and the founder and former pastor of Tabernacle Baptist Church in Clarksville, Tennessee. Each month, a speaker – usually an ordained Baptist minister – delivers an evangelical message to employees, physicians, patients and visitors at Baptist's flagship hospital. The message is also broadcast to all 21 of Baptist's hospitals in Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas, and it is promoted on Baptist's Facebook page.

The pastoral care team has placed "prayer crosses" in 13 Baptist Memorial Hospital lobbies, including in several of its Tennessee hospitals. Patients, visitors, employees and physicians can write prayer requests on colored strips of paper and submit them through slits in the cross. A chaplain then takes the prayer requests and prays over them.

Baptist Carroll County (formerly known as Baptist Huntingdon) and Baptist Tipton won QUEST 2020™ performance awards from Premier, a health care improvement company that unites 3,900 U.S. hospitals to improve the health of communities. Baptist Tipton won the Top Performance Threshold award for performing better than any other hospital in its peer group in four key areas, and Baptist Carroll County was named a Top Performance Threshold Award finalist for having the second highest performance scores in its peer groups.

We expanded our Acute TeleNeurology program to four Tennessee hospitals – Baptist Union City, Baptist Tipton, Baptist Collierville and Baptist Women's Hospital – giving these facilities the power to save even more lives. Through Acute TeleNeurology, an out-of-town neurologist can evaluate patients who may have suffered a stroke, seizure, severe headache, aneurysm or other neurological condition and help the onsite physician deliver treatment.

Baptist & Reflector

Striving for excellence has been a key phrase for the *Baptist and Reflector* in 2018. The paper was named by the Baptist Communicators Association as the second best state paper in the Southern Baptist Convention in terms of content and design. In addition, members of the Communications Team (which includes the *B&R*) of the Tennessee Baptist Mission Board captured several individual awards for material produced related to the paper.

The *B&R* is mailed to nearly 21,000 homes 26 weeks a year, reaching a potential readership of about 52,500 readers.

In addition, the *B&R* website has grown since it was introduced in late 2015. We have had more than 116,000 user engagements since January with 66,212 visitors and 196,553 page views.

The goal of the paper is to “tell the story of Tennessee Baptists” through news, feature stories and photographs. As in the past, the paper this year placed a major emphasis on what Tennessee Baptists are doing to reach the world for Christ by focusing on stories related to missions and evangelism. This year the paper has focused on timely topics such as domestic violence that impact Tennessee Baptists and our churches.

The *Baptist and Reflector* continued to utilize social media tools in 2018 such as Twitter. Editor Lonnie Wilkey regularly writes a blog that provides information for Tennessee Baptists between print issues. The paper also has a Facebook page that has been more prominent with the addition of David Dawson to the Communications Team.

The staff monitors trends that could affect Tennessee Baptists and prints those stories to keep readers informed. In addition, opinions, both from the editor and others, are printed and are intended to make readers think, reflect, and act.

The paper continually seeks to enlist new subscribers and will be offering a simplified subscription plan in the near future. We need more churches to send the paper to their leadership such as deacons, Sunday School teachers, etc. We are asking every reader of the *B&R* for the next year to consider sending one subscription to someone they know. IMB 2018 Report: What God is doing Through the International Mission Board
DAVID PLATT | JULY 16 2018

The IMB is a coalition of more than forty-seven thousand churches working together to support thousands of anonymous missionaries whose names and locations can't be shared in public because they are spreading the gospel at significant risk to their lives. Churches and the missionaries they send are the IMB, and I want to report to you on what they are doing.

I can't go into what *every* missionary is doing, but I do want to share a selection of their stories.

- Muslims are hearing the gospel for the first time in one of the largest slums in Sub-Saharan Africa.
- Thousands of refugees from Iran and Afghanistan are coming to know Christ in Europe.
- One church in a European city started four new churches in the past year. To give you a picture of the nations in those churches, six people were recently baptized—two were European, one was Chinese, and the other three were Iranian.
- A Yezidi refugee who was fleeing ISIS came to Christ and got baptized.
- Last month, after years of work, missionaries planted a church in a country that's almost 100 percent Muslim.
- In the Democratic Republic of the Congo, we trained 160 national pastors and missionaries to reach thirty-two peoples who have no Bible in their language.
- In one village in South Asia, our personnel trained forty pastors and church leaders to reach migrant peoples in the villages around them.
- God is raising up biblically grounded leaders for the church in East Asia through theological education that is now being conducted entirely in their local language.
- We are training leaders at seminaries in the Americas, Europe, East Asia, Southeast Asia, Africa, and the Middle East.
- After years of trying to get access to a particular unreached people, we finally have access. They will finally hear the gospel!
- We shared the gospel with a dying man who was a lifelong atheist. He trusted Christ one day, was baptized the next, and died the following day. This brother is now with Jesus!
- Refugees are coming to Christ, become disciple makers, and returning to their war-torn homelands to rebuild their communities on the gospel.
- An East Asian couple we trained is now being sent out as missionaries to a Middle Eastern country.
- Last week, alongside local partners, we shared with gospel with more than 1,100 Muslims in three days.
- Even as Venezuela implodes and people die of hunger or lack basic medicines, those remaining in the country, and those emigrating to other places, are coming to Christ as they hear the message of hope in the gospel.
- We're sharing the gospel with the Deaf around the world digitally and through social media, and they're coming to faith in Christ.
- Village leaders in one unreached area are begging us to come back and teach them more of the Bible.
- In one country in Sub-Saharan Africa, we trained nearly two hundred pastors in the characteristics of a healthy, biblical church.

A Man in a Dream

In addition to those highlights, let me share a story I recently received from one of our workers. The man replied, "You don't understand. I've had several dreams over the past three nights, and in each dream, a man wearing white has told me he had the way to salvation for my family and me. Last night, that man appeared to me again and told me a man dressed in white would come to my home the next

In a Muslim country in Southeast Asia, one of our missionaries was with a national partner named Ahmad. It looked like it was about to rain, and Ahmad asked our missionary if he could borrow an old shirt to wear as he rode his motorcycle because he didn't want to get his new jacket wet. Our missionary handed him a big white T-shirt.

Later that day, Ahmad was wearing that white shirt on his way home when it started raining. As many people do, he pulled his motorcycle over under an awning. As he stood there, waiting for the rain to pass, the owners of a nearby house came out and, as is their custom, invited Ahmad in for tea. He went in, and over tea, Ahmad thought, "I might as well share the gospel."

After he shared, he asked the couple, "Do you want to believe and be baptized?" Without any hesitation, they said, "Yes!" Ahmad was taken aback at how quickly they responded, and he asked, "Do you understand what you're doing? That your family will probably shun you for this, or even worse?"

The man replied, "You don't understand. I've had several dreams over the past three nights, and in each dream, a man wearing white has told me he had the way to salvation for my family and me. Last night, that man appeared to me again and told me a man dressed in white would come to my home the next day and share the way of salvation. When we saw you standing outside, we knew we needed to invite you in and hear whatever you had to say to us."

This formerly Muslim couple are now followers of the Messiah.

If anyone asks you what's happening at the IMB, you tell them disciples are being made, churches are being multiplied, and Jesus is being glorified among people who have never even heard his name.

She also encouraged all churches to get creative with mission projects in their area. She announced that a WMU/ladies Luncheon will be held at her home on February 24 for the purpose of motivating ladies to share ideas and work together for missions.

It was announced that State Training for VBS will be held at Crieewood Baptist Church in Nashville. Please pray for every church and VBS in our association.

As part of the DOM report Bro. Joe Shannon spoke of his recent trip to Virginia for witness training and his trip to Ecuador.

April

There were 5 Churches represented, Immanuel, Oak Grove, Pomona, Slayden & Waverly First. Bro. Scott Brown led a devotional from Genesis 32:22 about prayer reminding us to ask God for what we need and to be diligent to pray for souls to be saved.

Mrs. Carmen Westerman encouraged churches to have their teens' & children's groups write notes of encouragement to missionaries going to Ecuador.

Associational VBS training will be held on April 28 at Slayden Baptist Church from 9am-Noon. Please pray for every church & VBS in our association.

Bro. Joe Shannon stated that the state statistics say 51% of church attendees do not know the Great Commission, which is our mission as churches. He reminded us to pray and study the Word diligently so that our walk with Christ will be strengthened and we will grow closer to Him. Five churches from Truett were represented at the partnership church in the St. Louis area on Palm Sunday. The team was able to make over 200 contacts while canvassing the neighborhood.

The Link-Up Advisory Committee presented the possibility of a merger of the three associations under the leadership of Bro. Joe Shannon. This would include Judson, Stewart & Truett Associations. The merger is in the beginning stages, but the committee felt they needed the approval of the associations to further pursue the possibility. (See attached letter of explanation) Bro.
